Welcome back bowlers


Wow, where did the summer go? *It's time to get out the shoes, dust off the bowling ball and head for the lanes.*



Over the past 40 years I have missed maybe two seasons of bowling – one to Fort Benning and the other to who-knows-what in my teens. During most of those years I have always wanted to be a member of the prestigious 700 Club. I was “initiated” around 1983, back when initiations meant something and membership was an honor. Times have changed. High scores became easier. Equipment became more sophisticated – urethane, reactive resin balls, synthetic lane beds, etc. A *lot* has changed.

The Greater Cedar Valley USBC has decided to manage both clubs. This decision was not made lightly and has been discussed for almost two years. Conversations with local and state officers from both clubs have been maintained, and it was decided that our board would commit to manage, promote, “tweak”, run, and try to bring back some of the fun we should have as members!

To do this properly we need to stop and look at where we have been and where we want to go. Being a member should mean something - an honor. Here’s what we have come up with.

MISSION STATEMENT: The Greater Cedar Valley USBC 600 and 700 Clubs are organizations consisting of our BEST bowlers existing to promote the BEST in what our chosen sport of bowling has to offer:

- 1) Sportsmanship: The best positive attitude in the pursuit of honorable competition;
- 2) Integrity: Honesty and Fairness to all bowlers;
- 3) Charity: To volunteer for, promote and financially support our future through youth bowling;
- 4) Leadership: To set a good example through actively participating in our local organizations;
- 5) Friendly Competition: To bowl with, for and against each other as an example for our youth.

This is about being a true, actively participating member. This is about welcoming NEW members into the club and asking them to participate! Constructive thoughts, ideas and promotions are sought after and welcomed! Just talk to any board member!

We are looking at some major changes – all for the good!

1) Organizing: Building and keeping a membership database, and contacting / recruiting our membership similar to how we organize a board member to attend every league meeting.

2) Communicating: Most of us have email. Once-a-year post-cards and before-league announcements aren’t enough. We need to get with the times. Plan the work, work the plan! We cannot ask the bowling centers to do our promoting for us. We have to promote ourselves, using our own members and resources!

To paraphrase something Loretta Wander pointed out, “It’s do-or-die time. We either find a way to make these clubs work, or put them to rest.” She’s right. And we are not the only clubs facing these problems. This is not the fault of past officers. Every other club around the state – and nation – are having similar problems. How can we compete with rising prices, other tournaments and other bowling center events?

We will start with a membership drive and meeting. Association officers will begin collecting membership dues in October by canvassing the lanes. Or you can voluntarily place your name, phone number and email address on an envelope containing your \$ 3 membership dues and turn it in to the front desk of your bowling center, asking them to place it in the Association Mail Box. Your membership card will be given to you shortly thereafter.

Loretta is in both centers several times each week and will receive all dues and communications.

Senior moments

Advantages of bowling a Senior League in the Greater Cedar Valley USBCBA:

1. A number of choices, as there are thirteen daytime leagues at Maple Lanes, at least one every day.
2. You may choose morning or afternoon leagues at 9:15 a.m. or 1 p.m.
3. If you prefer, there is a 3-in-1 league at Cadillac Lanes on Tuesday at 1 p.m.
4. In all leagues, free coffee, and sometimes cookies, are offered to bowlers.



Roll a turkey, get a hug!

5. Some leagues take a coffee break at the halfway point of their bowling.
6. Quite often, someone will bring in donuts at break because of a birthday or anniversary.
7. The cost of bowling is much cheaper than in the evening leagues.
8. If you miss a day of bowling, you don't have to pay for a sub bowler—subs pay for their own bowling.
9. If there isn't a sub available and you miss, the most you pay is 25 cents to the prize fund. (However, in the 3-in-1 league, the bowler must pay for their sub or missed bowling).

10. In most leagues, a team is four bowlers, except for the Senior Stars at Maple Lanes and Senior Classic at Cadillac.

11. Handicap is figured on 100 percent of 210, except for the Senior Stars and Senior Classic leagues, which are scratch.

12. The best thing about senior bowling is that you meet many friends! Plus, senior bowling is low-pressure because there's not a lot of money involved, just older people that love bowling.

13. And... when you roll a turkey (three straight strikes), you'll get a hug from members of the opposite sex on both teams!




